Percussion 1 : snare drum, splash cymbal, two susp. cymbals (18", 14" crash), chinese cymbal (20"), sizzle cymbal, tam-tam (deep), two rototoms (14", 18"), two jazz cowbells (damped), triangle, tambourine, vibraphone, small (toy) clash cymbals, small Indian bell, large Chinese gong, bell chime

Percussion 2 : midipads triggering a Korg T3 synth (see note below), glockenspiel, snare drum, ride cymbal, two smaller cymbals (18", 16"), bell tree, sleigh bells, gato drum, spoons - also piano (primo) in mmt. VI.



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The archive voices in MONUMENT have been edited from a variety of radio sources - actualities, outside broadcast commentaries, interviews, documentary features, news reports, 'vox pops', public announcements, weather forecasts - and all but one of these originate from the BBC Sound Archive. Each source is numbered in the score, and following index identifies and describes the complete source recording.

BBC ARCHIVE SOURCES

- [1] LONDON BY NIGHT - 1935. A compilation of outside broadcasts from various locations in and around London, e.g. from Houses of Parliament, Croydon Airport, dance clubs, restaurants, theatres, etc., with continuity spoken by Robert Dougall.
- [2] DRIVING THROUGH LONDON - 1967. A traffic expert discusses potential traffic schemes with a reporter while driving from south of the Thames to Trafalgar Square..
- [3] TUBE PASSENGERS TRAPPED (I) - 1982. 'P.M.' report by Brian Widlake on an accident on the Central Line, followed by interviews with trapped passengers.
- [4] TUBE PASSENGERS TRAPPED (II) - 1982. News report by Laurie Mayer on the same incident.
- [5] SCOTLAND YARD - 1936. Documentary on police work in the capital, with acted dramatisations of typical incidents.
- [6] HIGH RISE RESIDENTS - 1977. Feature on life for elderly folk in a high-rise block trying to survive without a working lift, with interviews and a poem "High-Rise Blues" by resident Hyman Joseph.
- [7] ACCESSION OF GEORGE VI - 1936. Outside broadcast from St. James's Palace on the accession ceremony for George VI, with commentary on the scene, the actuality of the ceremony, the proclamation, and a 41 gun salute from St. James's Park (with separate commentary).
- [8] PETTICOAT LANE MARKET - 1936. Street atmosphere with war charity collectors and musicians.
- [9] SOUTH OF THE RIVER (I) - 1962. Tommy Steele recalls his childhood in Bermondsey.
- [10] SOUTH OF THE RIVER (II) - 1962. Billy Cotton recalls his childhood in Lambeth.
- [11] THEY SPEAK FOR THEMSELVES - 1939. Documentary on Mass-Observation, presented by its founders Tom Harrisson and Charles Madge, with individual items on some of their contemporary social research.

- [12] CIVIL CHANGES ON OUTBREAK OF WAR - 1939. Announcement of Government instructions regarding public congregations, air raid precautions, evacuation, etc.
- [13] PICCADILLY TUBE SHELTER - 1940. Wartime outside broadcast from Piccadilly Circus underground station.
- [14] TOURIST GUIDE - 1965. A coach guide describes London scenery to American tourists.
- [15] LONDON FLOOD DANGER - 1979. Documentary on the potential effect of a Thames flood.
- [16] ENGLISH DIALECT - 1952. Two East End girls prepare for an evening out.
- [17] THE TWIST - 1962. Interviews with two dancing instructors on the merits and demerits of the new dance craze.
- [18] THE BIG FREEZE - 1962. Report on life in the high street during the frozen winter of 62/63, containing interviews with shopkeepers, passers-by, etc.
- [19] CARNABY ST. FASHIONS - 1966. Fashion designers and boutique owners describe the latest fashions.
- [20] CARNABY ST. - 1967. Interviews with American visitors to London.
- [21] SECRET WORLD OF THE PLAYGROUND - 1967. Documentary analysing the social structure of children's playground conversation.
- [22] SARAH THE ELEPHANT - date unknown (early '60s?). Report (from a schools programme) on a mouth-organ playing elephant.
- [23] THE KRAY'S - 1972. Documentary on the East End gang.
- [24] LONDON FOG - 1962. Interviews with a bus driver and bus conductor on travelling conditions in the fog.
- [25] JACK DASH AS LONDON GUIDE - 1971. The ex-leader of the dock workers talks about his wish to become a tourist guide.
- [26] BIG BANG (I) - 1986. Report on the changing life of the stockbroker in the City, and the technological changes of the Big Bang, containing interviews with analysts, dealers, estate agents, etc.
- [27] THE NEW EASTENDERS - 1986. Documentary on the London Docklands Development Corporation, and the forthcoming construction of Canary Wharf.
- [28] BIG BANG (II) - 1986. News reports on the first day of computer trading in the Stock Exchange.

- [29] BATTERSEA POWER STATION - 1984. News report on plans to convert the Power Station into a theme park.
- [30] HURRICANE OF '87 (I) - 1987. The celebrated weather forecast by Michael Fish.
- [31] STOCK MARKET CRASH (I) - 1987. Actuality of tannoy announcement in dealing room.
- [32] HURRICANE OF '87 (II) - 1987. News report on hurricane damage in Kew Gardens.
- [33] STOCK MARKET CRASH (II) - 1987. News report on the crash in share prices.
- [34] THE BIG ISSUE - 1993. Recording of a vendor of the magazine on his pitch in Oxford St. Not from the archive, but recorded during the period of mixing the piece.
- [35] THAMES VIEW FROM ISLE OF DOGS FLAT - 1970. A resident describes the changing view from the window of her high rise flat.
- [36] BIG BEN CHIMES - 1948. Recording from inside the tower of the bells ringing the hour and striking twelve, with sounds of the clock mechanism.

MONUMENT was written between August and December 1992, and was recorded and mixed during January and February 1993.


A Korg T3 music workstation provides a metallic percussion sound triggered via midipads played by Percussion 2. Each pad plays a transposition of the following chord:

In mmcts. I, III, V, and VII, an electronic drum part (in Percussion 2) is played by the T3 sequencer on the following sampled sounds:

Cymbal bell Closed hi-hat Open hi-hat Snare drum Synth. snares (2 pitches)



In the stereo balance the closed hi-hat and upper synth snare drum are panned to the extreme right, the open hi-hat and lower synth snare panned to the extreme left, and the cymbal bell and acoustic snare positioned in the middle. During the sequenced passages various overlapping shakers also provide a continuous triplet pattern, and, with the cymbal bell on the backbeat, these enable the ensemble to remain in exact synchronisation with the sequencer.

At the opening of mmt. VII the sequencer also plays background musak as part of the shopping precinct atmosphere:
