Programme note.

Drinking Song is part of a collection of songs with the overall title of "Eat and Be Eaten". The collection revolves around the subject of food and drink in all their significance.

Several themes recur, and the subject of greed and the dangers of over-indulgence feature in a number of items. This song, is part of a venerable tradition of drinking songs and the text is taken from a 13th century French/Flemish motet, translated and adapted by the composer. It is scored for Tenor, Baritone & Bass.

The cycle of songs of which this is an item, was commissioned by The Song Company of Sydney.

NOTES: The text is taken from a 13th century Motet in a mixture of French and Flemish. The bits of the original text which are embedded in this version, should be sung sotto voce, on the same level as the "be-be-be"s, whereas the English text should be projected.
