Note on the texts:

Thomas Hardy's 'Weathers' is a fairly straightforward nature poem, though clear diction is required in one or two lines.

- 'Ceilidh' (pronounced 'kay-lee') = traditional Scots music gathering
- 'Cran' = uncertain - either a type of fish or a measure
